

- Higher rates of depressive symptomology
- Increased risk of alcohol and substance abuse disorders (Hardoon, et al, 2002)
- Increased risk of suicide ideation and attempt
- Higher anxiety (Gupta and Derevensky, 1998)
- Poor general health (Potenza et al, 2002)
- Delinquency
- Crime
- Disrupted relationships
- Poor academic performance (Wynne et al., 1996)



- Concepts of chance and randomness




- Multifaceted approach





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
